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Superintendent's Message Academic Results

Each year Alberta Education reports on numerous performance measures for Alberta school divisions in a report known as the Accountability Pillar Report. This report is very important as it helps to inform the success and opportunities for improvement in our schools and division as a whole. Data found in the report is carefully analyzed on an on-going basis while being considered in school and divisional planning. Our updated results show that 73.0% of students (combined in grades 3, 6, and 9) achieved the Acceptable Standard on the Provincial Achievement Tests, and, 11.6% achieved the Standard of Excellence.

Updated results on the Provincial Diploma Exam Courses show that 70.5% of students achieved the Acceptable Standard, and 8.5% of students achieved a Standard of Excellence.

Provincial Achievement Tests and Diploma Exams are only one measure of student achievement and results are best examined at the school level where the local context can be considered. Each school will be sharing school results within their local community.

I wish to congratulate students, staff and parents on working so well together on improving student achievement. As PRSD transforms to Inclusive Education, Achievement Test and Diploma Exam Results will be further analyzed to help inform instructional decisions that will lead to increased student achievement.

We look forward to getting our planning started early and making this year's graduation a success!






The Terry Fox Run Challenge!

wig. The National School Run day was held on September 27th with the entire student population walking to Pat's creek and back, to show that we are part of the Marathon of hope. Many students wore


stickers to show "who are you running for..."

Project Peace

Wow!!!!! What a month — I can't believe October is already here! It has been great getting to know all the new faces at Peace High this year — and welcoming back all the wonderful old faces too! Project PEACE has a new direction this year, and we have been spreading the word about all the new programs and events that we have planned! Our focus is on capacity building and preventative supports for all students/families — the Project PEACE Success Coach is here to connect youth/families to strengths within one's self, as well as to formal and informal supports in the school and in the community.

Our Peer Mentorship Program has started up again — we have 12 fantastic Mentors trained and already doing whatever they can to make all the new students feel welcome and connected! Our new 2 Minute Moments Program started this year — all of our students and staff are finding ways to connect together throughout the school year, creating a real sense of "family" within our school walls.

We have some new clubs running this year – our Chess Club started late last year, and it has continued throughout September, meeting every Tuesday and Thursday at lunch. We hope to connect with the Roving Chestnuts (out of Edmonton) for some great strategic learning – and we have the chance to travel to Grande Prairie and Edmonton for some tournaments, if we have enough interested group members.

Our Adopt-A-Nomads Program will begin in October – some of our training so they can spend time at Springfield school each week, mentoring the younger kids in their classrooms. This Program will be offered for 6 weeks in the fall, and then again for another 6 weeks in the second semester. On October 4th, a group of students will be participating in the Sisters In Spirit Walk – showing that the women who have been murdered or who have disappeared from our community have not been forgotten.

We are very pleased to announce that Constable Holly Porterfield from the Peace River RCMP is back at Peace High again this year — Constable Holly is available once a week, to offer support or to answer questions from any student. As well, we are very happy to welcome Keltie Hattfield to our community support team this year. Keltie is a terrific Addictions Worker and she will be available at Peace High each week as well. Both Keltie and Constable Holly also offer in class presentations, at the teachers request. In the upcoming months, Peace High will also be making dynamic workers available from the HIV North Society, the Women's Shelter, the Stepping Up Program and other community agencies to the students at Peace High, for one to one chats and/or class workshops.


