



What Will My Courses Be?



Core Classes (required) - for ALL Gr. 9s

2 Core classes are offered each semester

Math and Social in semester 1, ELA and Science in Semester 2

(French Immersion: Science, Math, Et Soc and FLA in French. ELA, electives, PE and Health in English)

- Physical Education (semestered)
- Success Blocks: Health, mandatory core classes and 2 choice during a week.

Students have the opportunity to choose elective classes each semester

Some of the elective courses available might include....

- Construction (framing and small scale construction)
- Metals/Mechanics (Welding, machining, basic mechanics and metalwork)
- Cosmetology (hair design, manicures, pedicures, makeup design, salon design)
- Drama (interactive class with a focus on Improv and Acting)
- Sports Performance (individual fitness planning, nutrition, injury management, basic anatomy)
- Art (creation and evaluation of art through a variety of medias)
- Spanish
- Digital Design (photography)
- Leadership/Mentorship







Some of the elective courses available might include....

- Fashion Studies (basic sewing, design, knitting and crocheting)
- Foods (theory and practical activities for cooking and food safety)
- World Religion (learning and discussion on different religions around our world)
- Sociology (the study of society, patterns of social relationships, social interaction and culture in everyday life)
- Psychology (the science of behaviour and mind)
- Anthropology (the scientific study of humans, human behaviour and societies past and present)
- World Geography (the study of places and the relationships between people and their environments)
- Robotics (construction and programming of basic robotic functions)



Learning Strategies

Learning Strategies 15, 25 are 3 or 5 credit courses which enable students in grade 10-11 a chance to learn about the following:

- 1. High School planning and Career Exploration
- 2. Post Secondary Information
- 3. Learning Styles
- 4. Organization and time management
- 5. Skills development (reading, math, memory, note-taking, exam prep, test anxiety)
- 6. Self-Advocacy

This is a participatory course where students are active in discussions, case studies, surveys and small in-class assignments. These mandatory courses are run on Monday's during Success block all year.



Grade 12 Monday Mandatory

Grade 12 students during their Success on Mondays are involved in activities such as:


- 1. Grad preparation

English Language Arts (ELA) Program




Refer to the Course Registration Guide for more detail on the content of the courses. The -1 stream would be recommended for previous course mark of 60% or higher. ELA 30-1 is a prerequisite for most Canadian Universities.

- Math 10C into the -1 and -2 courses in grade 11 and 12 is the academic stream preparing students for post secondary. Grade 9 Math mark of 60% or higher is recommended.
- Math -3 stream is preparing students for entry into some college programs, trades, the work force and high school graduation.
- Math -4 is the Knowledge and Employability Stream for High School students continuing math skills to prepare for a high school certificate of completion.

Mathematics Program


Possible Sequences-Mathematics Course Sequences



Mathematics 30-1 is a prerequisite or corequisite for Mathematics 31.


- Science 10 into the Bio, Chem and Physics courses in grade 11 and 12 is the academic stream preparing students for post secondary. Grade 9 Science mark of 60% or higher is recommended.
- Science 14/24 stream is preparing students for entry into some college programs, trades, the work force and high school graduation.
- Science -4 is the Knowledge and Employability Stream for High School students continuing Science skills to prepare for a high school certificate of completion.

Science Program



- Although the recommended transfer point from Science 24 is to Science 10, in exceptional cases, students may be placed by the principal in 20-level courses, as serves the student's best interests.
- Science 20 and 30 are available in English only.
- Students who have achieved a final mark of 50% or greater in Biology 20, Chemistry 20, Physics 20 or Science 20 may enroll in Science 30.

Social Studies Program



Refer to the Course Registration Guide for more detail on the content of the courses. The -1 stream would be recommended for previous course mark of 60% or higher. SS 30-1 can be used as a prerequisite for Canadian University programs.
